Informal Education and Evolution: Considering Religious Beliefs

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Zoos, aquariums, natural history museums, and science centers inevitably include material on evolution in their exhibitions. However, rarely are the messages in these exhibitions evaluated. Most exhibition centers are wary of even including the "E" word. To effectively teach evolutionary theory, we need a better understanding of the public's knowledge of and attitudes toward this subject.

We have been involved in a project to assess people's understanding of evolution and to determine what type of messages might be most effective in communicating evolutionary theory. The current report focuses on one aspect of our findings — the relationship between attitudes toward evolution/creation theories and the perception that evolution conflicts with Christian religions.

A 20-item attitude survey was given to 275 university students enrolled in introductory courses in psychology and biology. Respondents were asked to give their agreement or disagreement for each item. Only part of this data is reported here. The "Neutral" response percentages are not reported.

Results

Examination of Table 1 reveals several important findings: (1) Over 58% of respondents agreed with the statement "Evolution conflicts with my religious beliefs."; (2) Responses to the statement "Evolution conflicts with my religious beliefs" were strongly related to how respondents answered other questions; (3) While only 34% of respondents agreed that "Darwin's theory is essentially correct, 61% agreed with the item describing natural selection ("New traits in living things make a species more or less able to survive"); (4) Almost 50% agreed that a day in Genesis is 24 hours, while only 13% disagreed that a day in Genesis could represent thousands or millions of years; (5) Almost half of respondents agreed that God used evolution, while only 20% disagreed.

Discussion

The findings suggest that many people are confused about the evolution-creation issue. Over half believe that evolution conflicts with their religious beliefs. But, many repondents fail to understand what evolution is. Some of the conflicting answers (a day in Genesis is 24 hours and thousands of years) may be due to the fact that some respondents will agree with any statement that seems to generally support religion, even if that statement conflicts with other statements about religion. Note that some of these findings can be explained by the "Bible Belt" location of the survey.
