Project Description

Teen Science Cafes (TSC) are free out-of-school programs where teen leaders, adult leaders, and (STEM) experts collaborate to develop presentations and hands-on activities focused on exploring STEM topics in-depth with wider teen audiences.

The goals of the Teen Science Café Network (TSCN) project are to: 1) Provide informal educators with robust research based PD training that focuses on the Teen Science Café (TSC) model

2) Foster and build a nationwide community of enthusiastic and diverse Teen Science Cafe sites and audiences that demonstrate the value of TSC programming.

Audience & Settings

Audience: Youth ages 14-19

Disciplinary area: Science, Technology, Engineering, Math

Learning environments: Out of School Time venues (including afterschool programs, museums, libraries, aquariums, zoos, park & garden organizations,, and others)

Access and Inclusion

By joining forces with our community partners, the TSCN has connected with afterschool providers who focus on increasing the quality of out-of-school STEM learning opportunities for all young people especially underserved and underrepresented youth. In particular, the Million Girl Moonshot partnership has led to an increased focus on the inclusion of girls in STEM training.

Key Achievements

The TSCN has experienced a year of recovery after losing more than half of the Network's sites due to the pandemic. Though the TSC sites still struggle with a post-Covid decline in number of participating teens per site, this year the Network has almost doubled its number of active TSC programs nationwide. Over one-third of TSC adult leaders have reported that their teen leadership groups are a success and a source of pride (annual evaluation report August 2023). Within this project, we continue to evaluate and refine a training and mentoring process for new adult TSC leaders with the aim of providing a proven method for establishing an increase of long-lasting programs across the country.
